While transitioning the residential floors to office space, would it be possible for the management and Planning team to discuss with Urbis and Bates Smart the idea of transforming a couple of levels to a creative / artistic space. Or perhaps residences for musicians from the VCA and ANAM. This would be an approach that would greatly enhance the amenity of the project. It would add tremendous value to the project. At 45 Flinders Lane there is 45 downstairs Art Gallery and Theatrical Performance Space, and at Ground Level there is the Arc One Gallery Space. And next door to that is Craft Victoria. This is the ideal project to incorporate as well an arts gallery /studio space on the ground level. It could be a shining light for the arts community, this is a tremendous opportunity that should be taken. Having a sidewalk cafe associated with an adjacent art gallery would create a definite buzz to the precinct. This would be an optimum street activation that would work well with the cultural pedigree of this part of town. Consideration should also be given to allocate some levels for housing for citizens who have special needs.

There are citizens who have concerns over the height of the building, overshadowing issues with neighbouring properties and the appropriateness of windows on the eastern side of the building.

The building design does have a bit of pizzazz, looking like a Braun Electric Shaver. In regards to the new laneway, consideration should be given for the general public to have 24 hours a day access.

I concur with Cr. Leppert's statements about the complexities faced by officers in multi branches of Council in properly assessing proposals for Heritage Victoria applications.

Establishment of a coherent, comprehensive, consistent process, accessible across all Council branches, would ensure projects subject to Heritage Victoria application would be fully and properly assessed. This is currently not the case and leads to community concern (and objection) about the thoroughness of assessment and less than satisfactory outcomes.

I am writing to support this Motion.

It is an important step by Council to improve processes, policy and transparency at Council for Councillors, officers and for the public and will result in better documents and outcomes as well as fewer issues and costs in the future.

Places are formally listed and acknowledged on the city, state and national heritage lists because of their agreed outstanding significance to the people of Melbourne, Victoria and Australia and the agreed need to protect and preserve them and their listed values for posterity.

The community is very appreciative of the many wondrous heritage listed places and parklands located in the City of Melbourne and this motion for a more ordered, transparent, planned, holistic approach at council will be more productive and successful.

I commend Councillor Rohan Leppert for submitting this Motion and Councillor Nicholas Reece, the seconder.

I support and understand these are included in the Motion:

- changes, streamlining and public access to processing draft applications from City of Melbourne for Heritage Victoria Permits or Permit exemptions prior to lodging them with Heritage Victoria
- trying to ensure that there is co-ordination between the different areas of Council and that due consideration is given to assessing the impact of proposals on heritage listed lands and places and their listed values at Council prior to submissions being lodged at Heritage Victoria for a Permit or Permit exemption
- that National Heritage listings as well as Victoria Heritage Register listed places and land are to be included
- importantly, that the information and documents, including CMPs would be centralised at City of Melbourne and readily available to the public.
- considerations on establishing criteria for when draft Applications for Heritage Victoria permits need to go to Future Melbourne Committee
- that the report of the review will be presented for public consultation

I request that "council projects" referred to in the Motion heading includes Council's processing, assessment and approval of submitted permit requests from other land managers to City of Melbourne, such as from RBGV for on Melbourne Observatory State and National heritage listed land. This will offer needed comprehensive, integrated, consistent considerations and processing of permits on State and National heritage listed places and land at Council.

It is suggested that, additionally the following be included:

- that a time frame be specified to prepare a new or up-dated CMP (including community consultation) after an addition to the state or national heritage list is made, and for CMP reviews.
- that a Heritage committee including community representation be established
- that the Motion includes the Melbourne Planning Scheme Heritage Precinct Amendments, another pillar of heritage protection legislated for which consideration is needed prior to drafting proposals and Applications to Heritage Victoria for a Permit or Permit exemption
- could Council's review report perhaps be done in less than a year, for example in six months, say by March 2021?

This is an important step forward. It will be of major assistance to the community and to our Council. It will prevent issues like last week's Heritage Victoria application re St Kilda Road, unseen by Councillors and community until it appeared on Heritage Victoria website, despite the Grand Boulevard having effectively the most heritage protection offered in Australia (UNESCO world heritage listing being 'world').

It will be good to see Council taking leadership on this important matter and supporting best practice in work approaches to drafting proposals and heritage Applications on significant heritage places and land. Better co-ordination will facilitate better outcomes.

I urge Councillors to support improved processes, policy and transparency at Council. The current system is not consistent with vigorous heritage analysis, understanding and protection and this motion will improve business work processes so that there is a consistent, integrated approach and process embedding heritage considerations and assessments at Council before decisions are made or Applications lodged.

Notice of Motion, Cr Leppert: Council projects on land on the Victorian Heritage Register

The Royal Historical Society of Victoria supports the motion. We have in the past called Council's attention to matters in which the Council has failed to integrate heritage issues into its planning from the start. The review seems a good start to address these issues.

We believe, however, that the motion could be formulated more broadly in its scope. On the one hand, it includes only sites on the Victorian Heritage Register. As the responsible local authority, CoM is responsible for the administration of sites covered by Heritage Overlays. Surely the review should look at ensuring that the heritage implications of policy affecting these sites are considered from the start.

On the other hand, the motion appears to be focussed on parkland. CoM has responsibility for planning that includes more listed heritage places than any other Victorian council and it directly controls a number of significant heritage assets, of which the Queen Victoria Market site is the most well-known and the most extensive. Some revision of the motion, most particularly the background, could ensure that it is seen as including all heritage, natural and built.

We note, further, that CoM has an outstanding Heritage section. We believe that it should play a role in initial consideration of the heritage implications of policies and urge that words to this effect be included in the motion.

We believe, finally, that CoM could and should, like other councils, set up a Heritage Committee to consider the heritage implications of CoM policies and proposals from the start. We urge FMC to proceed in this direction.

In the hope that the motion as finally passed can address these issues, we support its passage.

Submission from Protectors of Public Lands Victoria Inc (PPLVic.Inc)

Ideally, in the view of Protectors of Public Lands, local jurisdictions such as the Melbourne City Council would have a high level of commitment to protecting Heritage listed areas under their control whilst overviewing and encouraging projects and activities that are essential to a dynamic and creative community.

In view of this, the overseeing of Heritage values and efficient assessment of and implementation of Conservation Management Plans (CMPs) are an essential part of the work of the City of Melbourne. City of Melbourne should function in cooperation with all Heritage bodies such as Heritage Victoria and the Heritage Council.

Four large areas of public parkland have recently been added to the Victorian Heritage Register and are of vital importance and value to the people of Melbourne. They need to be highly valued, respected and preserved.

There are also many properties and places within the City Of Melbourne that are on the Australian National Heritage register, including the Fitzroy Gardens, Queen Victoria Market, Melbourne Cricket Ground and Domain Parkland and Memorial precinct. The Carlton Gardens and Royal Exhibition Building are of course also World Heritage listed, and are therefore covered by the Commonwealth Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation (EPBC) Act. A review of processes and protocols required by the EPBC Act would include how decisions are made concerning applications for developments that could impact the listed heritage values on a temporary or permanent basis. A decision by a federal minister could then be required.

Protectors of Public Lands supports the proposed review of internal processes and protocols in relation to planning for works on the Victorian Heritage Register as in Cr. Leppert's motion, and also for planning concerning National and World Heritage.

Cr. Leppert points out the difficulty of multiple teams being involved in the preparation of CMPs and Heritage permit applications and requests for permit exemptions while suggesting a centralised point of advice. This aspect, presumably would be covered in the proposed review of processes and in principle would seem to be very advantageous to the process.

The aim should be to minimise time and energy of Council, Heritage Victoria and concerned members of the community and we thank City of Melbourne in showing leadership in this direction.

There is also a greater need for transparency and more input from the public involved in any Conservation Management Plans (CMPs) or Heritage issues. There is a great deal of knowledge and enthusiasm in the community, including community groups that support specific Heritage sites. City of Melbourne has also funded many Heritage reports that are not made easily accessible for the general interested public. It would be a very positive outcome were these to be made available for council and community.

It would be desirable for the review to be completed before September 2021, preferably within the next 6 months.

Dear Lord Mayor & Councillors,

Friends of the Royal Exhibition Building & Carlton Gardens submit as follows:

Notes that the new public parklands with VHR, are in addition to those already on the VHR. All the VHR heritage gardens and parks and places, are to be included in this initiative. These places will also be included in the Crown lands Reserves Act 1978.

In addition to the request above in "4" to management to review internal processes and protocols, COM has accountabilities and responsibilities for these Gardens and parklands under the Crown Lands Reserve Act 1978. As such council is the committee of management for each and all of these places. The review should include council's responsibilities under this Act. The review should also cover the interaction between the responsibilities under the Crown Lands Reserve Act and the Planning and Environment Act and the Heritage Act, as they relate. The management will report to council on gaps and failure, any inconsistencies and consequences within and between these Acts.

Notes that some of these heritage Gardens and parklands are also on the National Heritage Register and one, Carlton Gardens, has World Heritage listing. Places on the National Heritage Register and which also have World Heritage listing are covered by the Commonwealth EPBC Act. To ensure council meets all its obligations under the EPBC Act, a review be undertaken of these internal processes and protocols. Review will include processes and protocols for decisions on applications for change and development that may impact on some of the listed heritage values, permanently or temporarily, and which may require council to make a referral notice to the federal minister for the minister's decision on the permit requirements or control order.

Notes that the new Local Government Act, requires councils to increase and formalise their community consultation mechanisms. In making its report to council with recommendations on a community heritage advisory committee, management will take into account the new Act and also provide recommendations on options for alternative community consultative structures.

Carlton Gardens and its special significance emphasises the importance of this initiative and the public interest benefits that should result. The Carlton Gardens along with the REB, is Melbourne's only World heritage site. Yet Carlton Gardens has a Conservation Management Plan dated 2008 and its related Master Plan is dated 2005. The Gardens HMP is currently under review as part of the WHMP review. This is the first review of the WHMP since the WH citation in 2004. The 16 year gap is in itself a cause of concern. Moreover, Council seems not to have met its accountabilities and responsibilities under the Crown Lands Reserve Acts 1978, to provide public reports on the Gardens management which necessarily should include progress made in the implementation of the 2005 Master Plan.

Good Afternoon Councillors,

The NoM appears to be timely if a revision of processes and protocols within management is needed, given the number of lands added to the VHR.

Some suggestions:

Every action to parkland on the VHR should have "Valuing the Priceless: The Value of Historic Heritage in Australia" front and foremost. e.g. see Allen Consulting Group report (2005)

To be considered:

1/ Scope

This is too narrow. I note only 4 VHR sites have been identified for consideration. Why not all? Why not Fitzroy gardens? And the WH site of Carlton Gardens?

(The latter a complex system of management by numerous responsible authorities & numerous accountabilities)

2/CMPs - accountability & review procedures including timelines are to be expected, not just aspirational.

3/The Crown Lands Reserve Act 1978 will need to be referenced - how Council currently complies and how the act relates to these lands & permits, and any VHR listed others.

4/ How does this revision affect lands in the VH register under the Heritage Act? 5/The EPBC is also referenced in the VH register and National register. The responsibilities under the EPBC Act and WH guidelines are to be considered, and such actions' effect on heritage values.

6/ The revision should consider independent heritage advice other than solely HV's advice.

The EPA would have a position on such actions. So too would advisory committees which also include community representatives eg the Heritage Advisory Committee and the EAG which have been disbanded.

I look forward to the review from management to be reported to MCC by September 2021.
